

After leaving there, Jesus came into his own town, followed by his disciples.

When the sabbath came, he began to teach in the synagogue, and the many listeners were astonished and said, "Where did he learn all this? What is the

wisdom that has been granted, and these miracles that are performed by his hands? Isn't this the carpenter, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon? Are not his sisters here with us?" They found these things to be stumbling blocks.

Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometowns, and among their own relatives, and in their own households." And he could work no miracles there, apart from laving his hands upon a few sick people and healing them; their lack of faith astounded him. He made the rounds of the neighboring villages instead, and spent the time teaching.

Then Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out in pairs, giving them authority over unclean spirits. He instructed them that they should take nothing for their journey, except a mere staff - no bread, no bag, no money in their belts. They were to wear sandals but, he added, "Do not take a spare tunic."

And Jesus said to them, "Whenever you enter a house, stay there until you leave town. Any place that does not receive you or listen to you, as you leave it, shake off the dust from the soles of your feet as a testimony against them."

And so they set off, proclaiming repentance as they went. They cast out many demons and anointed many sick people with oil and healed them.
